Tips for the weekend – 27th / 28th January

Plastic microbeads are used in a wide variety of shampoos, shower gels and toothpastes. They are not removed by water treatment plants, as they are so tiny, and they end up in the sea where they are ingested by marine wildlife and contribute to the plastic 'soup' that is polluting our oceans.

If you would like to avoid buying products containing them there is a very useful website - www.beatthemicrobead.org. On it you can see a full list of UK products which contain microbeads.

This weekend we are asked to pray and reflect about homelessness. We are all accustomed to the distressing experience of seeing people sleeping in doorways or asking for money, and wondering how we should react.

Perhaps for most of us the strongest course is prayer with compassion, but you might like to contact the Open House in Crawley to ask how you can help.

Recent studies show that homelessness has increased in England. In 2016 on one night over 4,000 rough sleepers were counted, more than twice as many as in 2010; and over the last five years the number of households in temporary accommodation has risen by 60%. Among those classed as statutory homeless, the biggest group is single mothers, nearly half of the total.

Here again we have an opportunity to help, by offering services to the Life Houses in Crawley and Haywards Heath. (Please get in touch with the parish office to find out how we can help.)

The causes of homelessness are many and complex, but they are forces which can affect us all – the breakdown of a relationship with a friend or family; poor physical or mental health; issues with drugs or alcohol; or bereavement. Then there are issues of poverty, unemployment, and the shortage of affordable housing.

Those who become homeless are particularly vulnerable to a sense of isolation and mental health problems, and it becomes increasingly difficult to find work and accommodation.

Please pray for all those affected by this scourge, and consider what you might be able to do to help. We offer below a prayer for the homeless.

Hear our prayer today for all women and men, boys and girls who are homeless this day.
For those sleeping under bridges, on park benches, in doorways or bus stations.
For those who can only find shelter for the night but must wander in the daytime.
For families broken because they could not afford to pay the rent.
For those who have no relatives or friends who can take them in.
For those who have no place to keep possessions that remind them who they are.
For those who are afraid and hopeless.
For those who have been betrayed by our social safety net.
For all these people, we pray that you will provide shelter, security and hope.
We pray for those of us with warm houses and comfortable beds
that we not be lulled into complacency and forgetfulness.
Jesus, help us to see your face in the eyes of every homeless person we meet
so that we may be empowered through word and deed,
and through the political means we have,
to bring justice and peace to those who are homeless. Amen.

End Hunger - Holiday Provision Bill: Thank you to those of you, who have written to your MPs calling for them to support Frank Field's Holiday Provision Bill. Although sadly this wasn't passed, our message has been heard. As a result of the bill and our campaigning, the government has agreed to put in place a number of pilot schemes across the country, and will monitor the impact on children's health and attainment. This represents a major step forward in terms of the government taking responsibility for ending holiday hunger. Although we are disappointed they missed this opportunity to take lasting action which would ensure consistent provision across the country, we are glad they have taken a first step. The bill will return to Parliament in April, and we will continue to keep pressure on the government in that time.

2nd Reading – 1 Corinthians 9:16-19, 22-23

Gospel: Mark 1:29-39

On leaving eh synagogue, Jesus went with James and John straight to the house of Simon and Andrew. Now Simon's mother-in-law had gone to bed with fever and they told him about her straightaway. He went to her, took her by the hand and helped her up. And the fever left her and she began to wait on them.

That evening, after sunset, they brought to him all who were sick and those who were possessed by devils. The whole town came crowding round the door, and he cured many who were suffering from diseases of one kind or another, he also cast out many devils, but he would not allow them to speak, because they knew who he was.

In the morning, long before dawn, he got up and left the house and went off to a lonely place and prayed there. Simon and his companions set out in search of him, and when they found him they said, "Everybody is looking for you". He answered, "Let us go elsewhere, to the neighbouring country towns, so that I can preach there too, because that is why I came". And he went all through Galilee, preaching in their synagogues and casting out devils.
