Balcombe Craft Fair




RWC Reading List


'No Ballet Shoes in Syria' by Catherine Bruton




The Boy at the Back of the Class by Onjali Q Raúf

'Azzi in Between' written and illustrated by Sarah Garland




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
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
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
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Supporting Afghan refugees

A big **Thank you** to everyone who responded to the call for clothing, toiletries, toys and baby items for Afghan families in quarantine hotels in our area. The Afghan people who were in these hotels have now moved on to further 'bridging' accommodation in different parts of the country while longer-term accommodation is being sought for them.



RWC was very pleased to work in partnership with Sussex Aid for Refugees,
Humanity Aid, other local refugee support groups and charities under the
direction of West Sussex County Council Refugee Resettlement Team who coordinated charity efforts and a huge volume of donations – toiletries, clothes
including traditional clothes and toys to supply the immediate needs of Afghan
refugees in the hotels locally. Through working together, we sought to maximise efforts and
avoid collecting surplus donation. Through a combination of targeting specific requests and

creating wish lists where donors could purchase goods directly for the Afghans in need, this was largely achieved so that, collectively, we were able to supply essential items to those who arrived with nothing other than what they could wear or carry with them in the haste to leave.

At this time, we do not know of any Afghan families coming to resettle in the Crawley area but anticipate that this may change in the coming months and years of the Afghan resettlement schemes.

CHEESE PIE/DUMPLINGS

INGREDIENTS

Pie Dough Pinch of salt

400g flour Pinch of baking powder

60 ml sunflower oil 1 tsp yeast 100 ml milk 1 tsp sugar

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80 ml plain yoghurt


Filling

300g grated cheese (halloumi, or feta and cheddar mixed, or just use a white cheese, e.g. Lancashire

1 tbsp nigella seeds

Handful of parsley, chopped

Nadima's recipe from 'Shukran', a Syrian recipe book published by Village of Sanctuary refugee support group.



DIRECTIONS

Warm the milk to blood heat and add the yeast: it should start to bubble immediately.

In a large bowl mix the flour with the salt, add the oil and mix with a fork.

Add the yoghurt and yeast mixture, stir together (you may wish to use your hands now), press together to form a ball of dough. Add a little water if needed.

Take the mixture out of the bowl, drizzle in a little oil, replace the dough, cover and leave in a warm place for about 1 hour. It should double in size.

Mix the cheese, parsley and nigella seeds together.

Roll out the dough and divide evenly into about 12 pieces. Roll each out into an elongated oval shape.

Put approx 1 tbsp cheese filling onto each one, then bring the far right hand side towards you and the near right hand side away from you so it folds over. Dampen with a little water to make sure it sticks together.

On the left of the dough, fold the near left side away from you, dab of water on top then the far left side towards you and seal. You should have a boat shape with the sides folded a little way over the cheese.

Place them on a floured baking tray whilst you heat the oven to 200C Gas no 7.


When the oven is hot, put the cheese pies in for about 15 mins till golden brown.

Allow to cool for a few minutes before eating.
