# **Dear Parishioners**

I hope you and your families are well.

I should like to begin this week by congratulating all those who have volunteered to take part in one of the Synod groups which are meeting around the parish. There is still chance to join a group. The groups are a response to the invitation of Pope Francis for us to become the *Pilgrim People of God*, the Church searching together to find the right way forward, humbly putting ourselves into the hands of the Holy Spirit, through prayer and listening.

This week we celebrated the feast of The Immaculate Conception of Our Lady, the model for all Christians of humble prayer and an obedient response to God's loving invitation. We offer as a meditation for Advent an extract from a homily by St Bernard for the feast of the Annunciation. The author invites us to share the angel's dialogue with Mary.

You have heard, O Virgin, that you will conceive and bear a son; you have heard that it will not be by man but by the Holy Spirit. The angel awaits an answer; it is time for him to return to God who sent him. We too are waiting, O Lady, for your word of compassion; the sentence of condemnation weighs heavily upon us.

The price of our salvation is offered to you. We shall be set free at once if you consent. In the eternal Word of God, we all came to be, and behold, we die. In your brief response we are to be remade in order to be recalled to life.

Tearful Adam with his sorrowing family begs this of you, O loving Virgin, in their exile from Paradise. Abraham begs it, David begs it. All the other holy patriarchs, your ancestors, ask it of you, as they dwell in the country of the shadow of death. This is what the whole earth waits for, prostrate at your feet. It is right in doing so, for on your word depends comfort for the wretched, ransom for the captive, freedom for the condemned, indeed, salvation for all the sons of Adam, the whole of your race.

Answer quickly, O Virgin. Reply in haste to the angel, or rather through the angel to the Lord. Answer with a word, receive the Word of God. Speak your own word, conceive the divine Word. Breathe a passing word, embrace the eternal Word.

Why do you delay, why are you afraid? Believe, give praise, and receive. Open your heart to faith, O blessed Virgin, your lips to praise, your womb to the Creator. See, the desired of all nations is at your door, knocking to enter. If he should pass by because of your delay, in sorrow you would begin to seek him afresh, the One whom your soul loves. Arise, hasten, open. Arise in faith, hasten in devotion, open in praise and thanksgiving. Behold the handmaid of the Lord, she says, be it done to me according to your word.

One particular right which has been very much in the news recently is the right to claim asylum. Pope Francis has written a speech to mark the anniversary of the International Organisation for Migration. He says that behind every statistic on migration is the face of a brother or sister who needs to be protected; while in reality they are treated as "merchandise", "pawns on the chessboard", and as "victims of political rivalries". #### **BIG Green Steps**

Due to COP 26 the United Nations Climate Change Conference there is a lot in the media and conversations around climate change mitigation and reducing our carbon footprint. In our last newsletter we talked about how we need to make lifestyle changes, aiming to achieve 'a 5-tonne lifestyle'. Well how on Earth do we do this you might ask. Well we have three ideas to help you learn and take action to reduce your carbon footprint:

- 1. At the Sussex Green Hub on the last Saturday of every month we are just starting up our 'Carbon Watchers Clinics', which is loosely based on the philosophy of Weight Watchers encouragement, no blame, no shame and sharing ideas and tips to reduce our personal Carbon footprint.
- 2. Buy and read a book called How Bad Are Bananas? by Mike Berners-Lee. Mike tells us the effects of big carbon footprint activities such as aviation, heating, swimming pools etc and small changes we can make (bananas, naturally packaged, are good!). You can learn about other fantastic books and documentaries on this page. Read, watch, learn and take action now!
  - 3. Don't forget to use the <u>WWF Carbon Footprint calculator</u> app to see what your current lifestyle looks like, at the end it directs you to pages with information about areas you can improve.

Four schools over the last month have asked us about how they measure and reduce their carbon footprint, you will be pleased to hear that the WWF are working on a tool to help them.

# **Catholic Bishops' Conference of England and Wales**

#### **Honouring Sunday**

As the Synodal Pathway of listening and discerning unfolds, we the bishops of England and Wales, are paying particular attention to the hopes and fears, the joys and anxieties of all who are sharing their thoughts and feelings with us.

## Longing for our Lord

We are attentive to the experience of the last year or so, when we have lived our faith through the limitations of the pandemic. We have heard of the longing which some express as a "homesickness." We want to be in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament. We yearn to celebrate the sacraments together, especially the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass. We desire to be nourished by our Lord in Holy Communion. The live streaming of the Mass and the remarkable response of our Catholic communities to those in need, have provided comfort, sustenance and resilience.

#### The Eucharist, source and summit

The Eucharist is the source and summit of our spiritual and pastoral life. Many people have said to us that they have appreciated the noble simplicity of the Mass at this time, which has allowed the mystery and majesty of our Lord's sacrificial love to shine through. The central appeal of the Mass, its beauty and its transcendence, raises our minds and hearts to God in an unambiguous and compelling manner. Our Lord Jesus invites us to receive anew the gift of Sunday as the preeminent day, the day of the Resurrection, when the Church gathers to celebrate the Eucharist. Here we stand together before our heavenly Father, offering our thanksgiving and prayer, through our Saviour in the Holy Spirit. Here we receive Christ in his Word. Here we are nourished by Christ in his precious Body and Blood. This is our primary joy, for which there is no substitute, and from which we draw our strength.

#### The Gift of the Sunday Eucharist

The Sunday Eucharist is a gift; as God's holy people we are called to praise and thank God in the most sublime way possible. When the Church speaks of the Sunday obligation, it reminds us that attending Mass is a personal response to the selfless offering of Christ's love. At this time, we recognise that for some people there may be certain factors which hinder attendance at Sunday Mass. The pandemic is clearly not over. The risk of infection is still present. For some, there is legitimate fear in gathering together. As your bishops, we recognise that these prevailing circumstances suggest that not everyone is yet in the position to fulfil the absolute duty to attend freely Sunday Mass.

### Responding to the Gift

We now encourage all Catholics to look again at the patterns which they have formed in recent months with regard to going to Mass on Sundays. This would include consideration and reflection about what we might do on Sundays, such as sports or shopping, or other leisure and social activities. This review, and the decisions which arise from it, fall to every Catholic and we trust this will be done with honesty, motivated by a real love for the Lord whom we encounter in the Mass.

The Sunday Mass is the very heartbeat of the Church and of our personal life of faith. We gather on the "first day of the week," and devote ourselves to the apostles 'teaching and the fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers (Acts2:42). The Eucharist sustains us and spurs us on, renewing our gratitude and our hope. When we say "Amen" to Christ in receiving his Body and Blood, we express the love of God which is deep within us, and at the end of Mass, when we are sent forth, we express our love for our neighbour, especially those in need. These two dimensions reveal the full meaning of our faith. We are gathered together and sent out, we pray and are fed, we worship and we adore; these are intrinsic to our lives as those baptised into Christ.
