



Journeying Together: Collaboration Co-operation Co-Responsibility

Dear Parishioners

I hope that you and your families remain well in these difficult and troubling times. As always, I send my prayers and very best wishes to you all.

I am sure that in many of your homes you will already have set up your Christmas crib. I do hope so. I have some (quite literally) wonderful memories from childhood of the nativity scene standing in our sitting room, illumined by a candle, or the flickering light of the coal fire, which was sometimes reflected by the snow outside.

Pope Francis, in his reflection, Admirabile Signum, writes: The enchanting image of the Christmas crèche, so dear to the Christian people, never ceases to arouse amazement and wonder. The depiction of Jesus' birth is itself a simple and joyful proclamation of the mystery of the Incarnation of the Son of God...We come to realize that so great is his love for us that he became one of us, so that we in turn might become one with him. The stable and the manger evoke truths about Jesus' poverty, embraced for all of us: Coming into this world, the Son of God was laid in the place where animals feed. Hay became the first bed of the One who would reveal himself as "the bread come down from heaven" (Jn 6:41). Saint Augustine was impressed by this symbolism: "Laid in a manger, he became our food". Pope Francis relates how St Francis began the tradition in 1223, at Greccio, wishing to make the Nativity visible to all. The friars prepared everything on the night of December 25th, together with local farmers: When Francis arrived, he found a manger full of hay, an ox and a donkey. All those present experienced a new and indescribable joy in the presence of the Christmas scene. The priest then solemnly celebrated the Eucharist over the manger, showing the bond between the Incarnation of the Son of God and the Eucharist. Pope Francis continues: The crib shows God's tender love: The Creator of the universe lowered himself to take up our littleness. The gift of life, in all its mystery, becomes all the more wondrous as we realize that the Son of Mary is the source and sustenance of all life. In Jesus, the Father has given us a brother who comes to seek us out whenever we are confused or lost, a loyal friend ever at our side. He gave us his Son who forgives us and frees us from our sins...From the time of its Franciscan origins, the nativity scene has invited us to "feel" and "touch" the poverty that God's Son took upon himself in the Incarnation. Implicitly, it summons us to follow him along the path of humility, poverty and selfdenial that leads from the manger of Bethlehem to the cross. It asks us to meet him and serve him by showing mercy to those of our brothers and sisters in greatest need.

While thinking of the Nativity scene, I would especially invite young families to our "crib mass" on 24th. We will begin with some carols at 2.45, and start mass at 3 pm with a procession of all the children to the crib. I remember a tradition in Peru that everyone brought up models of animals to bring something of their own home and family to the church; please do encourage your children to bring their favourite animals (i.e. soft toys, not real ones!) to add to the crib. You will, of course, be welcome to take them home afterwards! I look forward to seeing you, and I send you all my very best wishes.

Invited December Reflection

This month we reflect on some of the characteristics of Jesus as we prepare to celebrate his birth at Christmas.

There are two phrases worth focussing as we prepare for Christ's coming, 'the light shines in the darkness' and 'full of grace and truth' This past couple of years have been difficult, the circumstances we have all lived through have brought out the best and the worst in humanity. Sometimes it is easy to be overcome by the struggles and cares of the world. It is easy to feel despondent when we know about this great gift of faith and yet we see how others determination to be independent of God can cause so many issues. It can feel like a world of darkness. But Jesus is the light that shines in the darkness, and John goes on to tell us why – it is because he is full of grace and truth. Grace without truth is empty, and truth without grace can be downright mean! Jesus perfectly embodies both. And in order to bring his light into the world, we must try to emulate him.

John 1:1-5, 14

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it. And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth.
