Recessional: Final (from *Symphonie No.1 in D minor, Op.14*): Louis Vierne (1870-1937)

Vierne wrote his first organ symphonie in 1899 (five others later followed) whilst he was still Widor's protégé and assistant at Saint-Sulpice (Paris): its Final has been a great 'warhorse' for organists and lovers of organ music ever since. On the surface it is full of optimism and life; however, the sensitive ear can detect twinges of much deeper emotion behind the outward Gallic flamboyance...

After his early successes, Vierne's life became the epitome of the tragic Romantic artist – beset and besieged, as he was, by numerous personal and professional disappointments, penury and ailing health. Whilst his star rose early - his genius and fame becoming widespread on both sides of the Atlantic after he was appointed organist of Notre-Dame in 1900 - he died, emotionally and financially exhausted, slumping across the organ at Notre-Dame during a recital as a result of heart attack.
