Dear Parishioners

I hope that you and your families are well. I send you all my prayers.

As we move into the season of Christmas decorations, carol services and nativity plays many households will be putting up their Christmas crib. This is a tradition which goes back hundreds of years, to St Francis, in 1223. Pope Francis writes about the first crib in these words: Fifteen days before Christmas, Francis asked a local man named John to help him realize his desire "to bring to life the memory of that babe born in Bethlehem, to see as much as possible with my own bodily eyes the discomfort of his infant needs, how he lay in a manger, and how, with an ox and an ass standing by, he was laid upon a bed of hay". At this, his faithful friend went immediately to prepare all that the Saint had asked. On 25th December, friars came to Greccio from various parts, together with people from the farmsteads in the area, who brought flowers and torches to light up that holy night. When Francis arrived, he found a manger full of hay, an ox and a donkey. All those present experienced a new and indescribable joy in the presence of the Christmas scene. The priest then solemnly celebrated the Eucharist over the manger, showing the bond between the Incarnation of the Son of God and the Eucharist. At Greccio there were no statues; the nativity scene was enacted and experienced by all who were present. This is how our tradition began: with everyone gathered in joy around the cave, with no distance between the original event and those sharing in its mystery.

Pope Francis goes on to meditate on the power of the crib to move us, maybe touching memories from childhood which were filled with a sense of wonder and joy. He writes: Why does the Christmas crèche arouse such wonder and move us so deeply? First, because it shows God's tender love: The Creator of the universe lowered himself to take up our littleness. The gift of life, in all its mystery, becomes all the more wondrous as we realize that the Son of Mary is the source and sustenance of all life. In Jesus, the Father has given us a brother who comes to seek us out whenever we are confused or lost, a loyal friend ever at our side. He gave us his Son who forgives us and frees us from our sins.

Setting up the Christmas crèche in our homes helps us to relive the history of what took place in Bethlehem. Naturally, the Gospels remain our source for understanding and reflecting on that event. At the same time, its portrayal in the crèche helps us to imagine the scene. It touches our hearts and makes us enter into salvation history as contemporaries of an event that is living and real in a broad gamut of historical and cultural contexts... God does not abandon us but is there to answer our crucial questions about the meaning of life. Who am I? Where do I come from? Why was I born at this time in history? Why do I love? Why do I suffer? Why will I die? It was to answer these questions that God became man. His

closeness brings light where there is darkness and shows the way to those dwelling in the shadow of suffering.

I pray that we will all experience the joy of Christmas through the crib and all that it means for us. Do please remember the Family Vigil Crib mass on 24th, and encourage your children to come to play their part as a character in the story. Do bring your friends and neighbours.



Sunday 24th December – Family Christmas Vigil, Mass of the Nativity. We invite our Parish families to join us for a Christmas Vigil Mass on Christmas Eve at 3pm. This will be a celebration for families with children of all ages. Children who would enjoy dressing up as nativity figures are encouraged to do so! We also ask that families bring an animal or angel to add to our crib—the children will then be invited to join the entrance procession to the crib and place this object at the altar. These animals and angels will be 'on loan' during the Mass and should be collected after Mass. (No live animal loans please!!)

The Mass will begin with carols at 3pm and will conclude no later than 4pm. This Christmas Vigil Mass welcomes all ages and will be family friendly in length, concept and language.

Tell supermarkets to ban bee-toxic pesticides

Recent studies have revealed major declines in global pollinator populations, with pesticides named as a key driver. Close to 75% of the world's crops depend on pollinators for sustained production, yield and quality. The cost of pollinating crops artificially would cost an additional £1.8 billion per year in the UK alone. Given that much of this damage is being done in the name of food production, UK supermarkets have a key role to play in reversing this worrying trend. At the very least, they must take measures to ensure that their global supply chains 'do no harm' to our already-struggling pollinators.

Much of the debate around the impact of pesticides on bees and other pollinators has focused on a class of chemicals known as 'neonicotinoids' (1 gram is enough to kill 125 million honeybees). After years of campaigning, the use of four neonicotinoids was recently banned in the EU and the UK and farmers here are no longer permitted to use these chemicals when growing crops (although they can still use other bee-harming pesticides). But neonicotinoids are still used elsewhere in the world. This means that many products on UK supermarket shelves will have been grown in a way which is extremely harmful to bees. In other words, we are exporting our environmental footprint to countries with weaker standards. UK supermarkets have huge global footprints and the power to make change. They urgently need to ban bee-toxic pesticides and support growers around the world to adopt more sustainable, non-chemical alternatives.

Join us in asking Asda, Aldi, Co-op, Iceland, Lidl, M&S, Morrisons, Sainsburys, Tesco and Waitrose to ban bee-toxic pesticides from their UK and global supply chains.
