Dear Parishioners

I hope that you and your families are well. I send you all my prayers.

Last week we shared some material published by the Holocaust Memorial Trust for Holocaust Memorial Day. This week I would like to share material published by a Jewish organisation, Jewish Voice for Peace. This is a group based in the United States which looks at Jewish life and culture from a perspective which is different from that of the Israeli government and that of the U.S. In anticipation of the Memorial Day they wrote an article entitled *This Holocaust Remembrance Day, Never again is now.* They write: As we approach International Holocaust Remembrance Day, we are confronted with a devastating truth: What we vowed never to allow to happen again is happening, right now.

Today, Gaza is a shell of its former self. Entire neighbourhoods have been wiped from the face of the Earth, replaced by a grey wasteland unfit for human life: bustling markets and crowded cafes, libraries home to thousands of precious books, bakeries filled with the smell of fresh bread — all of it turned to ash.

This Saturday, Israel and the U.S. will share solemn words about the Holocaust. They will tell us that we must never again allow this kind of evil to occur — even as both countries stand trial, respectively, for carrying out and complicity in the genocide of Palestinians.

One of the worst truths of the Holocaust is that such horrors can happen. It is entirely possible for a genocide to be carried out while the world watches, and it's happened more than once since the world vowed "never again."

I share this with you all because it is a Jewish perspective which is rarely heard in our news today, because this is largely dominated by the official accounts from the Israeli and U.S. governments. I invite you to look further at Jewish Voice for Peace on their website. <u>Jewish voice for Peace</u>

Please note that much of the material is quite harrowing.



A Place of Beauty and Joy

Worth Pro Earth - A Call to Action

Last Sunday John Paul de Quay gave us a talk about ecological conversion, at the invitation of the Worth Pro Earth group. He told us that humanity needs a new paradigm, a new way, to view the world; one which puts God, not ourselves, at the centre, and which can then embrace the truth that everything in God's Creation is interconnected. He quoted from the encyclical by Pope Francis, Laudato Si, beginning at #1: Saint Francis of Assisi reminds us that our common home is like a sister with whom we share our life and a beautiful mother who opens her arms to embrace us. "Praise be to you, my Lord, through our Sister, Mother Earth, who sustains and governs us, and who produces various fruit with coloured flowers and herbs". We are part of Creation, sharing life together with every element, but we have forgotten our origins. This sister now cries out to us because of the harm we have inflicted on her by our irresponsible use and abuse of the goods with which God has endowed her. We have come to see ourselves as her lords and masters, entitled to plunder her at will. The violence present in our hearts, wounded by sin, is also reflected in the symptoms of sickness evident in the soil, in the water, in the air and in all forms of life...We have forgotten that we ourselves are dust of the earth (cf. Gen 2:7); our very bodies are made up of her elements, we breathe her air and we receive life and refreshment from her waters.

For this reason, we need conversion to a new way of living and a new way of experiencing life. "The external deserts in the world are growing, because the internal deserts have become so vast". For this reason, the ecological crisis is also a summons to profound interior conversion. It must be said that some committed and prayerful Christians, with the excuse of realism and pragmatism, tend to ridicule expressions of concern for the environment. Others are passive; they choose not to change their habits and thus become inconsistent. So, what they all need is an "ecological conversion", whereby the effects of their encounter with Jesus Christ become evident in their relationship with the world around them. Living our vocation to be protectors of God's handiwork is essential to a life of virtue; it is not an optional or a secondary aspect of our Christian experience. Following some rather dire predictions about global warming, in reaction to COP28, WPE proposes ten **Action Points** for January: Energy Saving Ideas

- 1. Turn down your thermostat by one degree
- 2. Switch off your heating when leaving the house for a few hours
- 3. Fit draught-proofing strips to windows/doors and a brush strip over your letterbox
 - 4. Fit a hot water cylinder jacket to your water tank
 - 5. Keep furniture and curtains away from radiators to feel warmer
 - 6. Avoid drying clothes on radiators which will block out the heat
- 7. Silver foil placed down the back of a radiator will reflect the heat back in the room
 - 8. Turn off the lights when you're not using them, change the bulbs for LED bulbs
 - 9. Use your washing machine on a 30-degree cycle
 - 10. Dry your clothes on racks instead of using a tumble dryer

Kir Bennet Horner, our CAFOD representative, writes: The Lenten Season arrives early this year. We can already advise you of our Parish plans for CAFOD Lent Family Fast Day 2024, which falls on **Friday 23rd February.**

CAFOD asks that you focus your prayers this Family Fast Day towards subsistence sea fishermen in Liberia. Many die due to the lack of basic tools such as life-vests, GPS and compasses. West Sussex County Council write concerning clean air and wood burning

We're members of the <u>Sussex Air</u> partnership. Pressures on household finances may have tempted more people towards burning wood in the belief that it's cheaper or more environmentally friendly. But, did you know that burning wood releases more harmful carbon emissions than oil or gas?

New evidence shows that it actually:

- Harms your wallet: wood burning is almost always more expensive than other forms of heating.
- Harms your health: lighting fires in our homes is the largest source of harmful small particulate matter air pollution in the UK.
 - Harms the planet: wood burning creates more harmful CO₂ emissions compared to other forms of heating and we cannot reproduce trees fast enough to offset the CO₂ emitted by burning wood.

Find out your personal air pollution footprint compared to the UK national average by using this <u>Clean Air Calculator</u>. For details on how we're working to improve air quality across the county visit <u>Our website</u>. If you are thinking of purchasing a new stove, do ensure it is <u>Defra approved</u>. Under the Clean Air Act 1993 all Defra approved stoves have to pass tests to confirm that they are capable of burning an authorised coal or other solid fuel, but can also cleanly burn unauthorised fuels such as wood. Surprised by what you learned? Please do share it with your friends and family to help protect your health and the planet.
