Sixth Sunday of Easter (year B) 4th / 5th May 2024 No. 1381

Dear Parishioners

I hope that you and your families are well. I hold you all in my prayers and ask God's protection for you.

Next Thursday, May 9th, we celebrate the Feast of the Ascension, a feast which celebrates the power of God's love at work in Jesus on our behalf. In an older form of the liturgy, this was marked by the extinguishing of the Paschal candle during mass, thus signifying the end of the period of forty days during which, according to Luke's scheme, Jesus appeared to his disciples. (It is significant that St Paul did not share in these appearances, and therefore did not qualify as an apostle according to St Luke's criterion.) Today, we no longer extinguish the candle, as this can give the impression that the feast is about Jesus leaving us, his absence. In fact, of course, it is not about his absence, but about his triumph, and, as such, forms an equal part with the celebration of Easter. Both feasts celebrate his exaltation but using different symbolism. At Easter we speak of Jesus' triumph over death, and his return from the place of the dead; at the Ascension, we speak of his triumph over hostile spiritual powers - anything which might separate us from God - and his going up to heaven to share his Father's reign. In the second reading of the feast, we hear: *God* raised him from the dead and made him sit at his right hand, in heaven ... He has put all things under his feet. (Ephesians 1.20-23) Our celebration reminds us that this is all for our sake: Where the Head has gone before in glory, the Body is called to follow in hope. (Collect of the day) Elsewhere in the letter to the Ephesians, Paul writes: God raised us up with Jesus, and gave us a place with him in heaven. (2.6) In the earliest Christian liturgy the entire period of fifty days from Easter to Pentecost was regarded as one 'great Sunday,' a continuous celebration of the triumph of Jesus. Later, the liturgy adopted Luke's chronology - he is the only New Testament author who distinguishes the Ascension from the Resurrection - and divided the time, distinguishing Easter, Ascension and Pentecost. Today's feast leads into Pentecost, which we celebrate on Sunday 19th, by emphasising that Jesus sends the Holy Spirit from his place 'at God's right hand', sharing in the power and authority of the Father.

Please pray for vocations over the next month. Bishop Richard writes:

The journey from Eastertide to Ascension and Pentecost calls us to mission. This year, in the light of the new Pastoral Plan, the whole diocese is invited to come together, starting this Sunday, for four weeks of prayer to the Holy Spirit to grant us a missionary spirit, through the raising up of new vocations to all walks of life in the Church. Foremost among these vocations, we need priests. The priesthood is a special gift to the Church through which Christ is always present to pour out His Spirit on His people through the holy sacraments."

Have you ever thought about being a priest, or know someone who has? It's not always easy to know if God is calling you to priesthood. Our diocesan *Days of Discernment* aim to explore some simple tools for finding out, with time for prayer and an opportunity to learn more about the beautiful vocation of the diocesan priest, along with other men following the same path. Certainty is not required: the day may just be a chance for you to start thinking, to pray, and to ask questions. Our next day is on **Saturday 4th May** in Crawley, led by Fr Nicholas Harden. If you are a Catholic, unmarried male who is considering this vocation and would like to attend, please contact Fr Tristan Cranfield.

Earth Day 2024

This year the 2024 Earth Day theme was Planet vs Plastics, which highlighted the critical need to cope with the ever-growing plastic pollution problem. The theme's proposed goal is to reduce global plastic production by 60% by 2040, which calls for individual action to combat this crisis. The Big Plastic Count

The Big Plastic Count took place just over a month ago in which 225,000 participants took part. The UK is still producing far too much plastic. As part of the UK Plastics Pact supermarkets promised to make all their plastic packaging reusable, recyclable or compostable by 2025. If you counted all the pieces of plastic that the UK uses in one week, one second at a time, it would take you 53 years and 7 months.

The UK tops the charts for plastic waste per person globally, this is second only to the US.

Church Closure


From **Monday 15th July – Friday 2nd August** the church will be closed for necessary Maintenance.

Would anyone be able to help with parish catechesis?

You may remember that the Diocese has the ideal that every parish should offer its members some appropriate form of catechesis (religious formation), from "cradle to grave." We still have a long way to go! But we have made a start, with groups from the age of six to nine, and twelve to sixteen; but we would love to start the intermediate group for children between nine and twelve years old. The groups meet for an hour after Sunday mass, from about 11 am till 12 noon, on the third Sunday of the month during school terms. We will provide materials for your meetings with the children.

The only thing you will need is a love of that age group and the enthusiasm of the Holy Spirit!

News from our Diocese and from our Bishops

Bishop Richard issued his third Pastoral Plan for the Diocese "The Word Who is Life: The Call to Mission" in January. As part of the plan, church communities currently forming deaneries will become a moderated parish "community of communities". They write: "It is in the interests of us all – and all those people who so badly need to hear the good news, and all the generations of future disciples yet to be born – that we make real the vision our Bishop has set before us: the vision of our parishes as 'communities of saints [and] schools of discipleship'... The world needs the good news; we are the frail earthen vessels to whom he has chosen to entrust it to at this particular moment. We are the ones who have been sent." Please pray for the success of the Bishop's vision for our Diocese. It is not yet clear how our own parish will be affected by the changes, but we will keep you informed as it becomes clearer.

News from the Bishops of England and Wales

The Catholic Bishops of England and Wales (CBCEW) have issued a pastoral reflection on gender. The document, called *Intricately Woven by the Lord*, emphasises that all are welcome in the Church, but says that the sexual identity of an individual is not a purely "cultural or social construction." We are all created in the image of God, with a dignity given to us by our creator. The bishops stress that leading people to the fullness of life in Christ is a journey rooted in truth as well as compassion. They write: *Accompaniment is crucial to the journey of faith, and we wish to emphasise that everyone is welcome in the Church. It is vital that as followers of Christ we imitate the boundless mercy and compassion of God as we deal with the complexity of another's life. But this needs to be done with a clear understanding of the Catholic vision and understanding of the human person and a holistic view of human sexuality." The Rwanda Bill

Bishop Paul McAleenan, Lead Bishop for Migrants and Refugees for the Catholic Bishops' Conference of England and Wales (CBCEW), joined the Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby, and leaders from a number of Christian churches, to highlight their shared commitment to caring for the most vulnerable while paying tribute to all those who "live out Jesus' call to feed and clothe the poor, and to welcome the stranger, at times in the face of opposition and prejudice." In a separate statement issued by the CBCEW, Bishop Paul said: "The passing of the Rwanda Bill [on Tuesday night] fails to address the urgent need to ensure that there are more safe and legal routes by which asylum seekers and refugees can reach the UK. I once again call on our government for a more compassionate approach to migration; one that seeks to protect vulnerable lives and support those fleeing persecution and hardship."
