Dear Parishioners

On Sunday we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit and the birth of the Church. The Spirit is the life and love of God which He freely chooses to share with us. Jesus, after his ascension to the Father, participating now in His power and authority, sends the Spirit to us as his first gift to those who believe.

In his account in Acts cp 2, Luke draws on the traditions of the Jewish Feast of Pentecost (fifty days after Passover). Originally a harvest celebration, it eventually became a celebration of the gift of the Law at Mount Sinai. The later tradition told how all the nations of the earth were gathered there, and all heard the Law read in their own language, but only the Israelites accepted the Law and the Covenant. Luke applies this tradition to the gift of the Spirit; but now all nations receive the Spirit, and all are welcomed into the Christian community at baptism. (Maybe too there is a sense of the reversal of the confusion and division of the Tower of Babel here.)

John also has the sense of the creation of the community by the Spirit. Indeed, in cp 20, there is a scene of re-creation, remembering Gn cp 2: Jesus breathes on his disciples, fear is turned to joy, and they embrace their share in the ministry of Jesus – As the Father sent me, so I am sending you. The Spirit in John is the one who makes Jesus present to us again: The Father will give you another Paraclete (Encourager) to be with you for ever...He is in you, with you...I shall not leave you orphans. (14.16ff)

Most important for the development of the idea of the Spirit in the New Testament perhaps is Paul, especially in Romans cp 8. Here he shows how the gift of the Spirit draws us into the relationship of love between Father and Son, making us adopted children of God, sharing in the inheritance of Jesus. The Spirit allows us to share in Jesus' resurrection and to live a life of holiness (to walk according to the spirit) and to share in Jesus' prayer to the Father. "Abba" was the characteristic and intimate word of Jesus' own prayer, which, in the Spirit, we may share: The spirit of sons (and daughters), making us cry out Abba, Father...we are children of God, heirs of God and co-heirs of Christ. (8.14ff)

Finally, it is worth noting that in the Eastern Christian tradition the Spirit was regarded as the feminine principle in God. Using Syriac or Aramaic, their word for Spirit was a feminine word (ruah), which lent itself to motherly images: in Gn 1, the Spirit hovering over Creation is the motherly aspect of God; and in the psalms, words like In the shadow of your wings I take refuge (ps 57) were thought of as an appeal to the maternal protection of God in the Spirit.

Unity, love, joy, courage, tenderness, protection, prayer and intimacy with God, with Jesus and with one another: It is difficult to conceive of the riches we are offered today. Let us give thanks for the gifts of the Spirit and embrace them with joy and boldness.


Would anyone be able to join a group in your home area who could watch out for anyone who may not be able to attend mass for any reason?

The Norms for the Distribution of Holy Communion Under Both Kinds

When receiving Holy Communion, the communicant bows his or her head before the Sacrament as a gesture of reverence and receives the Body of the Lord from the minister. When Holy Communion is received under both kinds, the sign of reverence is also made before receiving the Precious Blood. The minister raises the Host slightly and shows it to each, saying, "The Body of Christ." The communicant replies, "Amen", and receives the Sacrament either on the tongue or in the hand. As soon as the communicant receives the Host, he or she consumes the whole of it. (GIRM, 161)

When receiving in the hand, the communicant should be guided by the words of St. Cyril of Jerusalem, writing around 400 AD: "When you approach, take care not to do so with your hand stretched out and your fingers open or apart, but rather place your left hand as a throne beneath your right, as befits one who is about to receive the King. Then receive him, taking care that nothing is lost."

The GIRM also states that Holy Communion distributed under both species is a fuller sign of the Heavenly banquet (no. 281). "Holy Communion has a fuller form as a sign when it takes place under both kinds. For in this form, the sign of the Eucharistic banquet is more clearly evident and clearer expression is given to the divine will by which the new and eternal Covenant is ratified in the Blood of the Lord, as also the connection between the Eucharistic banquet and the eschatological banquet in the Kingdom of the Father."

(Eucharisticum Mysterium, May 25, 1967, no. 32)

No one is required to receive under both species, but the Church does encourage it. If one only partakes in the Host, they must remember they are receiving the fullness of Christ – Body, Soul, and Divinity. Thus, it is the choice of the communicant to receive from the chalice.

For the reception of the Precious Blood, the GIRM, no. 286 states: "Each communicant, after receiving the Body of Christ, moves to the minister of the chalice and stands facing him. The minister says, "The Blood of Christ", the communicant replies, "Amen", and the minister hands over the chalice, which the communicant raises to his or her mouth. Each communicant drinks a little from the chalice, hands it back to the minister, and then withdraws."

The only ministers who communicate themselves are Bishops and priests. Deacons and lay persons are to be ministered to and are never to communicate themselves. For this reason, it is not proper, at any time, to take the Host to the Chalice and dip the Host into the Precious Blood.

Next weekend there will be a Second Collection for The Missionary Endeavour of the Diocese (Diocese of Chulucanas).

Citizen Science

What is Citizen Science?

Citizen Science projects bring together scientists and public volunteers, to collect data. These projects are invaluable in conservation, making it possible to collect information that scientists alone would be unable to access. As well as helping advance research projects, becoming a citizen scientist is an amazing way to learn about plants and wildlife. https://growwild.kew.org/ Get involved in one of the following ways:

1. Nature's Calendar

Does climate change affect timings in nature? What effect has recent weather had on wildlife? The Woodland Trust's citizen science project, Nature's Calendar, is all about tracking the effects of weather and climate change on wildlife. By joining Nature's Calendar, you can contribute to a biological record dating back to 1736. Choose locations that you visit regularly where you can monitor one of more of your chosen species. Help us track the effects of weather and climate change on wildlife near you. Visit https://naturescalendar.woodlandtrust.org.uk/ to get involved.

2. National Plant Monitoring Scheme (NPMS)

While the popularity of citizen science projects is growing, plants have been left behind. The NPMS aims to survey abundance and diversity of plant species, the foundation of all our ecosystems, across different habitats in the UK. This helps us to understand the health of these habits. You will be randomly allocated at 1km square to visit near where you live, where you can record plant 'indicator species' in small plots. Visit https://www.npms.org.uk/ to find out how to get involved.

3. Flower-Insect Timed Counts

Flower-Insect Timed Counts (FITs) take ten minutes and can be done anywhere, including gardens and parks. It is a simple survey part of the UK Pollinator Monitoring Scheme (PoMS) that collects data on the total number of insects that visit a particular flower.

Spend ten minutes watching flowers and insects in good warm, dry weather during daylight hours. Visit https://ukpoms.org.uk/ to get involved.

4. Bee Walk

The bumblebee-monitoring project led by the Bumblebee Conservation Trust encourages you to learn how to identify bumblebees. Take a walk along a route once a month and record online which bumblebees you see. Visit https://beewalk.org.uk/ to get involved.
