Dear Parishioners.

I hope that you and your families are well, and that you are enjoying some good holiday time together in this warm weather.

As I write today the Church celebrates the Feast of the Assumption of Our Lady into heaven. Although this was only defined and officially made a feast in 1950, the tradition of the Assumption goes back many centuries, especially in the Eastern Churches, where it is often called *The Dormition*, or *Falling Asleep*, of Mary. It is particularly relevant to us this year as a sign of hope in this Jubilee Year – "a sign of sure hope and comfort to your pilgrim people" (collect of the mass). The celebration expresses the Christian faith in the ultimate destiny of God's people, with Mary sharing in the victory of Jesus over death and all forms of evil, and everything which diminishes the dignity of the human race as created by our loving God.

This trust in the God of liberation is expressed by Mary in the Magnificat – her hymn of praise, celebrating God's saving intervention in our history through the Incarnation of Jesus. She sings in solidarity with all the poor and oppressed of the world: "My soul magnifies the Lord, and my spirit rejoices in God my Saviour... He has brought down the mighty from their thrones and exalted those of humble estate; He has filled the hungry with good things, and the rich he has sent away empty."



From the Diocese: Update on the Move to a 'Moderated Parish' Model



The new Parish of North West Sussex is currently being established as a new canonical parish, bringing together Churches from what is currently the Deanery of Crawley.

Why? Given the falling number of ordained priests, in order to continue to carry out our mission effectively, we must adapt our structures and better support our clergy. Bishop Richard's hope is that by linking our existing communities in one new 'canonical parish', we can create more integrated, collaborative and flexible ways of working across the seven church communities in our current deanery.

What does this transition represent? (1) Greater pastoral cooperation among our Church communities, with a shared identity rooted in prayer and worship, (2) A freeing up of clergy to focus on their responsibilities to preach the Word, celebrate the Sacraments, and provide pastoral care by rationalising administrative demands, (3) Providing formation and training, so to enable all our people to engage in the local mission as baptised members of the Church. Bishop Richard says, "it will give us the flexibility to respond to current

challenges in a way that is resilient, sustainable and adaptable. Without such a bold step, the pressure on the priests that we do have will become impossible for them to bear."

What has happened so far? (1) The clergy have come together, prayed, and started to outline a structure and plan. They have met and shred out responsibilities in the new parish. (2) Areas that can start to benefit from mutual support have been identified, including schools, care of the poor and sick, and sacramental preparation. (3) Clergy and heads of the individual parish finance committees have met to discuss the future. (4) Bishop Richard has appointed Canon Tim Madeley to serve as Moderator for the new parish. As Moderator, Canon Tim will lead the clergy and a dedicated Leadership Team, ensuring the vision of the pastoral plan meets local needs and priorities. (5) The individual churches have been allocated into two geographical hubs—(a) Horsham Hub: St John the Evangelist Horsham, Corpus Christi Henfield, St. Gabriel Billingshurst, and the Shrine of Our Lady of Consolation and St. Francis West Grinstead. (b) Crawley Hub: St. Francis & St. Anthony Crawley, St. Bernadette Tilgate, Our Lady Queen of Heaven Langley Green, St Edward the Confessor Pound Hill, Christ the Lord Broadfield, St. Theodore of Canterbury Gossops Green, Our Lady & St. Peter East Grinstead, English Martyrs Horley, St Bernard Lingfield, and *Our Lady Help of Christians Worth Abbey*.

What will continue in the new 'canonical parish'? For the most part, the familiar rhythms of church life will continue, with some adjustments. Priests will continue to celebrate the Eucharist and other Sacraments, but the greater sharing of pastoral ministry should enable priests to call more easily on each others' expertise to allow priests with particular gifts to share them more readily across the local Church in support of our mission. Deacons will continue to officiate baptisms, weddings, and funerals. Priests will continue their work, living in the same house, with the same administrative support. Individual church names will remain the same, and there is no immediate effect on the use of our buildings.

What will change? What will happen next? (1) A leadership team made up of clergy and parishioners will be established, (2) a proposal to establish the new parish will be sent to the Council of Priests in October 2025, (3) A new finance committee will be established on the establishment of the new parish, and existing finance committees will continue as "Stewardship Committees", (4) a new enhanced website will be developed using a platform proposed by the Diocese, alongside other communication and data-management tools.

Inevitably, change can be challenging. So it is important that, as plans are developed, we continue to listen to and support each other as brothers and sisters in Christ. Bishop Richard says, "I invite everyone in the Diocese to join with me in forging our parishes into communities of saints, into strong, lively and welcoming schools of discipleship."

Supporting Our Parish Family



Our parish is a place where faith is nurtured, friendships are formed, and God's presence is encountered—in the sacraments, in silence, in song, and in each other. It is a place many of us turn to for strength, consolation, or simply the rhythm of prayer in the week.

But like every household, our parish has practical needs too. Since our last appeal in 2023, our costs have risen by over £15,000, yet our budgeted income for this year is only up by £2,000. That leaves us with a £13,000 shortfall. Rising expenses for maintenance, utilities, staff, the Church, diocesan levies all contribute to this growing gap. If you're a UK taxpayer, **Gift Aid** allows our Parish to claim an additional **25p for every £1 you give**, at no cost to you. And, if you are a **higher-rate (40%)** or **additional-rate (45%) taxpayer**, your giving can go even further. You can personally reclaim the difference between your tax rate and the basic rate—either through your Self Assessment or by requesting an adjustment to your tax code. Example, on a £100 gift, parish receives £125, and you can claim back £25.

Stop assisted suicide - action needed!

We can still win the fight for life. The assisted suicide bill is expected to have its Second Reading in the House of Lords on Friday, 12 September. Right To Life UK has launched a tool to help you write to a few Peers with a tailored message to highlight key concerns with the Bill. Right to Life UK says: "Despite the Leadbeater assisted suicide Bill passing its Third Reading on 20 June, it scraped through by just 23 votes (314–291), a significant

reduction in support after it had passed its Second Reading with a 55-vote majority. This now leaves the Bill limping into the Lords with a very narrow majority. Because it is neither a Government Bill nor was it part of any manifesto, the Lords are fully entitled to heavily amend, time-out or outright reject this dangerous Bill. This means the Leadbeater assisted suicide Bill can still be defeated.

It is therefore vitally important that Peers in the House of Lords are made aware of the many problems with the Bill and how introducing assisted suicide would put vulnerable people at risk. Unlike MPs, Peers do not represent constituents and are not elected by the public. This means that communication to Peers needs to be prudent, measured and focused.

Take Part in CAFOD's Gaza Crisis Appeal.

Starvation is spreading across Gaza. As the Israeli government's siege starves the people of Gaza, people are being killed at food distribution sites. Supplies are exhausted, and more lives are being lost each day.

Pope Leo has appealed for "an immediate halt to the barbarity of the war." Decisive action is needed now.

This is not just a humanitarian crisis - it's the systematic erosion of what makes us human. The UK government is right to condemn Israel's current actions in Gaza and suspend trade negotiations with Israel. But this is far too little.

Retrouvaille is a programme with a Catholic origin. Their focus is saving marriages. They help couples from different faiths, and those who do not belong to any faith community. A team of three couples and a priest present the Retrouvaille weekend. These couples have grown through serious disillusionment, pain and conflict in their own relationships, and they offer hope as they share their personal stories of struggle, reconciliation and healing. This helps participants find the courage to express some of their own pain with their spouse in a safe and private place. In sharing their values and insights, Retrouvaille couples invite hurting couples to see how listening, communication, conflict management and forgiveness are healthy tools for building a stable relationship.
