Dear Parishioners.

#27 Mary Best



Mary was born in Grayshott in Hampshire, in a Catholic home for unmarried mothers. "I was very fortunate to be adopted by the most loving catholic parents who then welcomed two more adopted children into the family," she remembers. When Mary was five, the family moved to East Grinstead as her father took up a new Headship at Imberhorne School, which was just opening.

Mary and her sisters attended Notre Dame Worth School, and she later trained as a teacher at Digby Stuart College (now part of Roehampton University). She found her true calling in teaching, spending thirty-three happy years working with Reception-age children — a career she describes as deeply rewarding and joyful.

A 'Cradle Catholic', the Church and faith has "always been an integral part of my life", Mary says with a smile. Her connection to Worth Abbey is rooted in family history: during the Second World War, due to the bombings, Mary's mother was evacuated to Worth from her teacher training college in Liverpool. Her father used to walk from Three Bridges station to Worth to visit her. With her parents' fond memories of Worth, many years later, Mary joined her parents in becoming parishioners at Worth Abbey, when her husband retired from the army and they settled in East Grinstead.

Years ago, when Father Rod called for volunteers to help with Junior Church, Mary stepped up. She says, "it felt it was something I could help with. That was back in 1999 and here I still am!" She loves sharing her faith with the community: "I enjoy sharing my knowledge and beliefs with the children, plus we have a very happy community who share this commitment. I have benefited from the support of Worth parish and made new friends. It is lovely to see the children grow and develop in their own beliefs."

Mary describes her faith as her "cornerstone in life." She finds great comfort and strength in prayer, especially the rosary, which helps her navigate life's ups and downs with a smile.

A prayer, saint, or bible verse that inspires you? Being named after Our Lady has felt special to me. The Hail Mary, Salve Regina and hymns to Mary have always been an inspiration. Visiting Lourdes and Fatima hold a special place I'm my heart.

What activities do you enjoy? I enjoy gardening, walking with our dog, reading, visiting galleries, the theatre and my favourite treat of all the Royal Ballet at the Opera House. I am fortunate to have family and friends who share my interests!

What plate of food brings the best memories? Fish and chips with my cousins when we visited them in Yorkshire! The treat at the end of a long journey. Always delicious!

A cherished memory of being part of this parish? My parents had their funerals at Worth. On both occasions Father Kevin officiated and made each Mass so special. I always think of them when I walk into Worth on a Sunday morning, such a cherished and joyful memory.

What are your hopes and prayers for the future of our parish? I hope our Parish continues to grow, as it is such a welcoming community. I hope younger men will feel called to join the Benedictine order.



#28 ROWENA LEANEY

Rowena's story began in Bushey, Hertfordshire, where she was born and later attended Loreto College in St Albans. Life brought her to Brighton in the early 1970s, and it was there that she met her husband, Peter. Together, they raised three sons—Chris, Jon, and Alex—while building a family life full of love and shared memories.

For more than 30 years, Rowena dedicated her career to education, working one-to-one with children with special needs at Cottesmore St Mary in Hove. "I loved my job. It didn't feel like work," she says, though she admits that "some days were very challenging." Two years ago, she retired—a well-earned pause after decades of making a difference in the lives of God's children.

Rowena's connection to Worth began in the late 1990s when her son Alex joined Worth School. "When I first came to Worth, I joined the choir and helped on the Fair Trade stall," she recalls. Today, her energy is focused on the Junior Church team—something she says she really enjoys.

And the team has grown too: "There used to be about six of us, but now we're twelve, so it's much more manageable!" About thirteen years ago, curiosity about her roots sparked a journey that changed everything. "I had always wanted to discover more about my Irish roots," Rowena shares. Taking an Ancestry DNA test opened the door to a family she had long wondered about. "I was fortunate and very happy to find them." That single test led to new connections: a cousin in Scotland,

her brother in Lancaster, and her sister and cousin in Ireland—the ancestral home of her family. "I now have regular contact with my extended family and, when I look in the mirror, I finally know who I look like."

Life has brought its share of joy and heartbreak. Rowena speaks movingly of her youngest son, Alex, who had a rare allergy to antibiotics that damaged his lungs. "We were waiting for a heart and lung transplant, but, tragically, this did not happen," she says quietly. Through that deep sadness, the Worth community became a source of strength. "We were very grateful that at that difficult time, the monks here at Worth gave permission for him to be buried in their cemetery. Knowing that he is at Worth has made my grief journey more bearable." Faith continues to sustain her through life's challenges. "My personal journey has again been particularly difficult over the past eight months," she reflects, adding how being on the parish prayer list has been "especially comforting."

From the joy of finding her birth family to the comfort of a caring community, Rowena's story is one of resilience, faith, and love—woven together by deep roots and open-hearted connections.

A prayer, saint, or bible verse that inspires you? St. Anthony. Whenever I lose something he is my first port of call.

What activities do you enjoy? I go to paracise classes weekly and am a member of Brighton Rock Choir. We are fortunate to have sung at the Royal Albert Hall, Wembley, Notre Dame, 4 weeks before the fire, and many other places too.

What plate of food brings the best memories? Christmas lunch with all the family.

A cherished memory of being part of this parish? My My husband and I celebrated our Golden Wedding Anniversary in May. Unbeknown to me, Erica Ballard sent a request to Rome and Fr. Paul presented me with an Apostolic Blessing from Pope Francis. Thank you Erica!

What are your hopes and prayers for the future of our parish? I hope that the number of families coming to Worth continues to both increase and flourish as they are our and the church's future.

#29 Susan Pearson



Sue was born in Barrow-in-Furness, where her early days included attending a Church of England infant and junior school—complete with morning visits from the Vicar. She fondly recalls going to church with her grandfather and growing up alongside her younger brother. She was confirmed into the Anglican Church in her early teens.

Training as a radiographer at the local General Hospital was Sue's first step into the working world. In her early twenties, she ventured down to London, working first in a small local hospital and later in a large teaching hospital—all the while finding community and support through the local Anglican churches she attended.

Eventually, Sue moved back north to Manchester, where she met George. They've now been happily married for nearly 53 years—a wonderful journey filled with love, family, and plenty of memories. You might spot George making sure Sue gets to Mass on time, which she takes in good humour! Together they have two daughters, one granddaughter, and three grandsons. Their eldest daughter's international adventures, living in places like northeast China and Manila

in the Philippines, brought rich experiences of attending churches abroad. Sue recalls, "Going to Churches in both of the countries, made a big impact on me!"

Sue and George settled in Crawley Down, and have been living there now for 40 years. Sue was deeply involved with All Saints Church there until nearly 30 years ago, when a profound faith journey, sparked in part by her experience with breast cancer, led her to become a Catholic. She first discovered Worth Abbey during "Mission '88 in Crawley Down," and it wasn't long before she fell for the calm, welcoming atmosphere of the Abbey church. "The moment I walk in, especially during Mass, I feel a peace that's hard to explain," she says.

Sue has worn many hats at Worth Abbey over the years: Reader, member of the original Mass Choir, helper at the Worth Day Centre, and now part of the Junior Church team and a keen "Stitcher." For her, being able to connect face-to-face with others is truly important—a sentiment many will warm to. Her faith has deepened beautifully over the years. "In the Anglican Church, sometimes I felt a bit of a wall come up," she reflects, "but at Mass, there's none of that. It's very hard to explain."

Facing health challenges in recent years, Sue credits her faith—and perhaps her medical training too—with helping her stay strong. Do say "hello", she will welcome your chat with a lovely smile.

A prayer, saint, or bible verse that inspires you?

Psalm 121 is a favourite. We had it at our Wedding. "I lift up my eyes to the hills. From where does my help come? My help comes from the Lord, who made heaven & earth. He will not let your foot be moved, he who keeps you will not slumber... The Lord is your keeper; the Lord is your shade on your right hand. The sun shall not smite you by day nor the moon by night. The Lord will keep you from all evil; he will keep your life. The Lord will keep your going out and your coming in from this time forth & forevermore."

What activities do you enjoy?

Going out with George, seeing family and friends. Volunteering with Breast Cancer Now. I'm a textile artist, working in wet-felting, needle-felting and embroidery. I enjoy going to craft fairs with my stall of wet-felted onto silk chiffon scarves, small pictures and bags.

What plate of food brings the best memories? Roast Turkey with all the trimmings,no brussel sprouts! Brings back bitter sweet memories, but I do like everything about Christmas.

A cherished memory of being part of this parish? Vigil Mass at Easter, esp. the one when I became a Catholic.

What are your hopes and prayers for the future of our parish? I hope children and young people continue to come to Worth Abbey Parish.

<u>Update on the Move to a 'Moderated Parish' Model:</u> The new Parish of North West Sussex is currently being established as a new canonical parish, bringing together Churches from what is currently the Deanery of Crawley.

Why? Given the falling number of ordained priests, in order to continue to carry out our mission effectively, we must adapt our structures and better support our clergy. Bishop Richard's hope is that by linking our existing communities in one new 'canonical parish', we can create more integrated, collaborative and flexible ways of working across our current deanery.

What does this transition represent? (1) Greater pastoral cooperation among our Church communities, with a shared identity rooted in prayer and worship, (2) A freeing up of clergy to focus on their responsibilities to preach the Word, celebrate the Sacraments, and provide pastoral care by rationalising administrative demands, (3) Providing formation and training, so to enable all our people to engage in the local mission as baptised members of the Church. Bishop Richard says, "it will give us the flexibility to respond to current challenges in a way that is resilient, sustainable and adaptable. Without such a bold step, the pressure on the priests that we do have will become impossible for them to bear."

What has happened so far? (1) The clergy have come together, prayed, and started to outline a structure and plan. They have met and shred out responsibilities in the new parish. (2) Areas that can start to benefit from mutual support have been identified, including schools, care of the poor and sick, and sacramental preparation. (3) Clergy and heads of the individual parish finance committees have met to discuss the future. (4) Bishop Richard has appointed Canon Tim Madeley to serve as Moderator for the new parish. As Moderator, Canon Tim will lead the clergy and a dedicated Leadership Team, ensuring the vision of the pastoral plan meets local needs and priorities. (5) The individual churches have been allocated into two geographical hubs—(a) Horsham Hub: St John the Evangelist Horsham, Corpus Christi Henfield, St. Gabriel Billingshurst, and the Shrine of Our Lady of Consolation and St. Francis West Grinstead. (b) Crawley Hub: St. Francis & St. Anthony Crawley, St. Bernadette Tilgate, Our Lady Queen of Heaven Langley Green, St Edward the Confessor Pound Hill, Christ the Lord Broadfield, St. Theodore of Canterbury Gossops Green, Our Lady & St. Peter East Grinstead, English Martyrs Horley, St Bernard Lingfield, and *Our Lady Help of Christians Worth Abbey*.

What will continue in the new 'canonical parish'? Priests will continue to celebrate the Eucharist and other Sacraments, but the greater sharing of pastoral ministry should enable priests to call more easily on each others' expertise to allow priests with particular gifts to share them more readily across the local Church in support of our mission. Deacons will continue to officiate baptisms, weddings, and funerals. Priests will continue living in the same house, with the same administrative support. Individual church names will remain the same, and there is no immediate effect on the use of our buildings.

What will change? What will happen next? (1) A leadership team made up of clergy and parishioners will be established, (2) a proposal to establish the new parish will be sent to the Council of Priests in October 2025, (3) A new finance committee will be established on the establishment of the new parish, and existing finance committees will continue as "Stewardship Committees", (4) a new enhanced website will be developed using a platform proposed by the Diocese, alongside other communication and data-management tools. It is important that as plans develop, we continue to listen to and support each other as brothers and sisters in Christ. All are Called to Serve



"Each of you should use whatever gift you have received to serve others, as faithful stewards of God's grace in its various forms." (1 Peter 4:10)

This month, we are opening a new round of sign-ups for our parish ministries.

Our parish is much more alive when each parishioner shares their unique gifts. Whether it is proclaiming the Word, welcoming people at the door, singing in the choir, helping with the altar, working with our children and young people, or supporting our hospitality ministries — there is a place for you. The bible reminds us:

"Do not neglect your gift, which was given you." (1 Timothy 4:14)

As our Parish continues to grow and evolve on our 60th year, we are calling for a renewal of active participation to keep the momentum. "The harvest is plentiful, but the labourers are few." (Matthew 9:37) Here is a list of ministries you can get involved with:

- 1. Liturgy and Sacraments: Altar servers (children and adults welcomed), readers of the Word, writers who draft the Universal Prayers, Eucharistic Ministers, Abbey Choir, Junior Church, flower arrangements group, and the Welcome Ministry. There are rotas for all these services so parishioners are not serving every week, except for the choir which does not use a rota system but instead allows members its members to join whenever they are available.
- 2. Family Faith Formation: Mustard Seed Group (3-5), All Saints (aged 6-8), Faith Alive (9-12), Inspired (13-15), parents' group. These groups meet monthly every 3rd Sunday, and volunteers are encouraged to help the group leaders in facilitating the lessons and activities, with the aim of helping our youngest parishioners and their families grow in faith through community.
- 3. Hospitality and Parish Socials: Hosting House Group/s, Sunday Refreshments Team, Fair Trade stall, monthly Parish Brunch Social team (2nd Sundays of the month, after Mass), and Parish Wine and Cheese Social team (one Saturday a month, after Mass)
- 4. Prayers and Adoration: Bible Study Group (Mondays), Rosary Group (Mondays), Lectio Divina (Tuesdays), Eucharistic Adoration (Wednesdays and Sundays, including immediately after Sunday Mass), Vigil for Vocations (first Fridays), the new Worth Intercessory Team, and Christian Meditation (monthly).
- 5. **Community and Communications:** writers and contributors for our **In Touch newsletter**, online parish interface (website and socials), the **Worth Pro-Earth**, **RCIA** and **Alpha courses**, **food bank and giving to charities**.

Ministry is not just about "helping out." It is discipleship in action — a way to live out our baptismal calling and to bring Christ's love into the heart of our parish. God calls each one of us to "serve one another humbly in love." (Galatians 5:13)

We invite you to prayerfully consider where—not whether or not—God may be calling you to serve. Let your answer be: "Here I am, Lord; I come to do your will." (Psalm 40:8–9) Take this opportunity to step forward, grow in faith, and strengthen our parish family.

. The assisted suicide Bill passed its Third Reading by just 23 votes (314–291). This now leaves the Bill with a very narrow majority. Because it is neither a Government Bill nor was it part of any manifesto, the Lords are fully entitled to heavily amend, timeout or outright reject this dangerous Bill. This means the assisted suicide Bill can still be defeated. It is therefore vitally important that Peers in the House of Lords are made aware of the many problems with the Bill and how introducing assisted suicide would put vulnerable people at risk. Communication to Peers needs to be prudent, measured and focused.


Other Announcements & Activities
